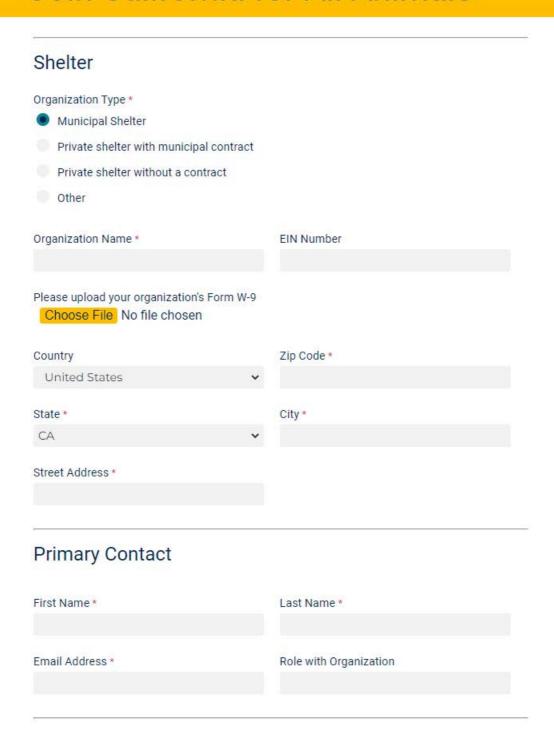

What policies, programs, and services do you currently offer or have in place? Select all that apply. Field services - Animal Service/Control Officers are employees of the shelter and calls for complaints/concerns in the community are handled and dispatched by shelter employees. Community Cat Program - Shelter Neuter Return (SNR) - Cats brought to the shelter by community members. The cats are sterilized, vaccinated and returned to where they came from. Community Cat Program - Traditional Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) - Cats are trapped with the intent of bringing them to a shelter or clinic for sterilization and vaccination and then returned to where they were trapped. Shelter animal Behavior/Training/Enrichment - Animals are helped to cope with being in shelter and as they transition to a new home or return to their home by incorporating behavior, training, and/or enrichment into daily care. Shelter spay/neuter - Have surgical capabilities (facility and staff) to perform S/N surgeries at the shelter for animals that come into the shelter. Public spay/neuter - Have surgical capabilities (facility and staff) to perform S/N surgeries at the shelter for animals who are owned by the members of the community. Public wellness clinic - microchip/vaccinations - Provide identification (collars with ID tags and/or microchips), vaccinations, medical exams and monthly preventatives (flea/tick, heartworm, dewormer) to pets owned by members of the community. Public full service veterinary clinic - Provide veterinary care (surgery +/- dentistry, diagnostics, treatment plans, etc.) for pets owned by members of the community. Public behavior resources - (e.g. forward facing resource library) - Provide easily accessible information and resources for members of the community who are interested in working to resolve behavioral issues that they are experiencing with their pet(s) and/or are looking to prevent potential issues. Public dog behavior/training classes - Provide easily accessible classes (online or in person) for members of the community who are interested in working to resolve behavioral issues that they are experiencing with their pet(s) and/or are looking to prevent potential issues. Intake diversion helpline - A staffed phone line dedicated to helping folks with questions and concerns about their pets or other animals they are concerned about in their community. Staffing could be by paid personnel or volunteers. Resources and advice are offered to help resolve issues and/or help owners rehome pets on their own. Foster program - cats - Have an established (and staffed) program overseeing and managing volunteers who foster kittens and cats in their homes. Foster program - dogs - Have an established (and staffed) program overseeing and managing volunteers who foster puppies and dogs in their homes. Self rehoming support for owners (i.e. Home to Home) - Provide access to a website (either the shelter's own page or other external page) and help create pet profiles for owners who need to rehome their pets. Open adoptions/adopters welcome - Support and use an open adoption process that is conversational and focuses on providing support post adoption to help both the pet and the
